• Definition: the art of photography & camerawork in film making

The 5 C's of Cinematography:

- Camera angle
- Continuity
- Cutting
- Close ups
- Composition

Story:

- Pitch what is the story in a sentence
- · Beginning, middle and end
- Who is the Audience?
- Clarity of narrative break it down
- Strong close

So whether it's a short, a documentary, a promotional video....whatever it is there are some basics to creating an entertaining film with an interesting story.

That story could be told through dialogue.....it could be told through visuals.


This is a good place to get started with story and content writing. We will be going through this in much more detail in the advanced course.

You always need to be thinking ahead, planning, envisioning your movie, thinking about the edit all these things will help you make it a reality and will eliminate a lot the mistakes that can happen

Storyboards



Story boards for me are a massive asset. They really help take the pressure off. They don't have to be this detailed.

When going out shooting today I simply wrote the shots I needed, a couple of locations or subjects I had in mind for these shots.

And after I got each simply ticked them off the list.

Editing:

- Choices what you show, what you don't
- Starts when you are shooting
- Shooting for the cut
- Colour Correction
- Colour Grading

Cinematography is about taking the assets we have learned, so things like...

- The different shots we have, Establishing, close ups, medium shots etc
- Angles
- Framing
- Cuts
- Colour
- Lighting
- Composition
- Sounds
